# Creating A "Ghetto"



- 1. Take One All-White Suburban Subdivision (House Value: \$250k)
- 2. Add One Black Upper-Class Family (Ad Executive & Physician To The Neighborhood
- 3. Sprinkle In Some Xenophobia Among Some White Homeowners
- 4. Take Out a Few White Families, Putting Those Houses For Sale
- 5. Add Two More Upper-Class Black Families (Lawyers, Professors) To The Neighborhood Who Buy The Houses For \$230k
- 6. Sprinkle In Irrational Fears Of What "Might" Happen Because Black Families Have Moved In
- 7. Remove A Few More White Families. There Aren't Enough Upper-Class Black Families To Move In And With Three Black Families, Whites Won't Move In
- 8. Houses Take Longer To Sell And Prices Go Down To \$150k. Working Class Black Families Can Move In. It Is Now A Mixed-Class "Black Neighborhood"
- 10. The Black Doctors, Lawyers, Executives, and Professors Move Out.
- 11. House Can't Sell And Bought By "Investors" For \$100k Who Rent Them To People With Lower Incomes
- 12. Eventually This Becomes a Low-Income Neighborhood Where Houses Are Valued At \$60k
- 13. Supermarkets, Banks, and Shopping Centers Are Replaced By Liquor Stores, "Check Cashing Joints", and The Underground Economy. It Is Now A Radically Depressed Neighborhood... Which The News Shows In That White Suburb Where A Black Executive And Lawyer Just Moved

### Segregation

The degree to which various racial groups are distributed throughout a city or other residential environment in a way that, ultimately, limits both access and opportunity.



Imagine a city with 48 families in it where 8 (17%) of the people are black

This version of that city would have total (100%) segregation.

# • White Flight?

Four percent of Detroit Whites would move if there were one Black family in their 15-house neighborhood. That number jumps to 15 with 3

Black families? Five families? THIRTY PERCENT! WHY? Prejudice, stereotypes about integrated neighborhoods, concerns about property values, and "neutral ethnocentrism"

# • White Fight?

In spite of the Fair Housing Act of 1968, between 60% and 90% of houses shown to Whites are never shown to Blacks. "Steering" also persists. · Choice?

Twenty-five percent of Blacks wouldn't move into an all-Black neighborhood. Seventyseven percent would prefer a 50/50 neighborhood
